The LARGE QUEENS ½¢ to 3¢ values 1868 - 1882

<u>Background</u>: On July 1, 1867 the Colonies of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia joined in Confederation to create the Dominion of Canada. On April 1, 1868 new stamps were issued to replace the three existing stamp issues (each of the Colonies had issued stamps prior to Confederation). The domestic letter rate was reduced from 5ϕ to 3ϕ , the letter rate to the USA was reduced from 10ϕ to 6ϕ and the letter rate to the UK via USA had earlier been reduced from 17ϕ to 15ϕ on January 15, 1868.

<u>Plates:</u> For most of the large Queens only one plate was prepared. The plates were never hardened, so that they could be re-entered when necessary. The combination of small margins between the stamps and inaccurate early perforating machines resulted in well centered stamps being elusive.

<u>Colour</u>: Stanley Gibbon's colour key #2530 has been used as a guide in naming ink colours.

<u>Perforations</u>: The Stanley Gibbons Instanta perforation gauge has been used to measure perforations.

<u>Paper thickness</u>: Paper thickness has been measured with a Mitutoyo No. 2804S-10 paper micrometer. Six measurements were taken where possible (four on the $1/2\phi$) to the nearest 0.00005", averaged and then rounded to the nearest 0.00005". Care has been taken not to count measurement taken at points where the dated cancel has become embossed in the stamp. Embossing can increase the apparent measurement by as much as 60%.

<u>Stamp size</u>: Most of the large Queens were issued in 24 X 20 mm format, but the $\frac{1}{2}\phi$ value was issued in a smaller 20 X 17 mm size.

<u>Deliveries and Classes</u>: The Duckworths recorded orders and deliveries of large and small Queens from the order of the first printing up to June 30, 1872. Unfortunately the British American Bank Note Company's Journal 'A' which contained the information on quantities and dates of deliveries has subsequently been lost. From July 1, 1872 to February 3, 1882 dates and quantities of orders have been determined from the Post Office Department's letter book. Some of the Printing orders do not appear in this exhibit, they exist but I have not yet found a dated copy in the required time period to illustrate them.

<u>Purpose</u>: This collection of the first stamp issue of the Dominion of Canada has been prepared to illustrate the development of the large Queens in terms of changes in paper, perforation and shade resulting from the many printing orders and, to this end stress has been placed on the collection of dated copies. This is a stamp collection supported by proofs. You will not find here large multiples, trade sample proofs (printed on card in black, red brown and green) or proofs prepared by competitors vying for the printing contract (Canadian Bank Note Engraving and Printing Co. proofs of 1891), as they played no part in the printing of these stamps.

PAPERS

The Duckworth numbering system has been used for papers 1 to 10 including papers 9a and 9b. Paper 5 has been divided into thick and thin, paper 8 has been re-named 6a, paper 8b has been added as the thicker paper of the 1/2 small Queen issued in 1868 and paper 10 has been divided into 10a smooth and 10b grained. Papers used after July 1, 1872, have been numbered chronologically from paper 10b. References are made to Shoemaker's, Mitreit's and Hillson's paper types.

Definitions: Thin 0.00200" - 0.00250". Thinnish 0.00255" - 0.00300", Medium 0.00305" - 0.00350". Stout 0.00355" - 0.00400" and Thick 0.00405" - 0.00510". Stiff: A stiff paper has a snap to it when subjected to the bending moment test, sometimes called hard or crisc paper. Soft: A schipaper has a low resistance to a bending moment.

Paper 1 - AP 1868 - A medium in ckness semi-transparent stiff paper with a vague structure, usually vertical but sometimes horizontal and an off white to buff colour. The impression of the design is blurred. The design shows through this paper very well, which caused early students to describe it as thin Paper 1 has the appearance of a somewhat oily surface. It has been found on the 1/26, 10, 26 and 36 large Queens (0.00285" - 0.00345").


Paper 3 - AP/1868 - An ordinary, medium to stout, wove paper showing faint to medium horizontal mesh. The impression of the design is moderately sharp, comparable to paper 2, but the paper itself is less transparent. This paper varies in thickness, the horizontal mesh being more evident with thicker versions. Paper 3 has been found on all values of Large Queens except the 5¢ (0.00320" - 0.00370").

Paper 5a - AP/1868 – A thinnish off white, horizontally laid paper which gives a moderately sharp impression. The perforations are often irregular as they did not separate cleanly. It is found mostly with the 3¢ large Queen both 1st and 2nd deliveries. The 1¢ LQ has been reported on paper 5a. According to Pack the laid lines of paper 5a are spaced approximately 14 per 2 cm. (0.00280" – 0.00305").

Paper 6 - AU/1868 - The "Bothwell" paper, medium to stout, with a distinct vertical grain, spaced 2.5 lines to the mm. When held to the light a vertical diamond pattern can be seen. The impression is variable but usually <u>snarp</u> contrary to what has been reported earlier. The design is approximately 0.3 mm, taller and somewhat narrower than on paper 3 and the perforations did not separate cleanly (0.00320" - 0.00390" with one outlier at 0.00240").

Paper 8a - SE/1868 - A soft, white as chalk, non-absorbent paper of medium thickness, with a vague horizontal structure and is very opaque. It shows a sparkle effect, when held obliquely to the light due to mineral inclusions in the paper. It produced sharp impressions and superbly rich shades due to the fact that the link stood up on the paper and was not absorbed. (0.00280° - 0.00345° with one outlier at 0.00430°).

Paper 9a - AU/1868 - A thinnish paper, very white, with the same absorbent appearance as paper 8a, but with a delicate mesh, horizontal or vertical. As with paper 8a impressions are sharp and rich in colour. Stamps with vertical mesh are tailer and narrower than those with horizontal mesh. The 1¢-brown-red (NO/28/68) and 6g (OC/5/69) large Queens have been seen on it. It does not exhibit the sparkle effect seen on paper 8a (0.00250* - 0.00270*).



Paper 4 - AP/1868 - A medium to stout horizontal wove paper, somewhat yellowish in tone: a faint diagonal ribbing can usually be seen. Despite the stoutness of this paper the design can often be seen from the back. This has led some collectors to mistakenly classify certain examples of paper 4 as thin. The impression of the design is sharp. Paper 4 has been found on the 1¢ brown-red, 2¢, 3¢ and 6¢ large Queens (0.00340" - 0.00360").

Paper 5b - AU/1868 - A medium to stout horizontally laid paper found mostly with the 1¢ large Queen. Three copies of the 2¢ LQ are known. Paper 5b takes an excellent impression. The 1¢ was issued about August 1, 1868 and formed part of the third delivery of 1¢ stamps. The 2¢ was likely part of the third delivery of 2¢ stamps also of August 1, 1868. According to Pack the laid lines are spaced approximately 13 per 2 cm (0.00330" - 0.00390").

Paper 7 - AU/1868 - A rather coarse, medium thickness paper with an ivory tone and a vague vertical structure. It is relatively transparent, gives a blurry impression of the design and most examples show perforation damage. The design is approximately 0.3 mm taller and somewhat narrower than the design on paper 3, similar to paper 6. Paper 7 can be found on the 1¢ brown-red, 2¢, 3¢, 6¢ and 12½¢ large Queens (0.00290° - 0.00350°).

Paper 8b - AU/1868 - Similar to paper 8a, this is a stout paper which nevertheless allows the design to be seen clearly from the back. Like paper 8a it gives a sharp impression and has a fine horizontal grain. The surface is slightly rough and the tone varies from very white to yellowish and there are brown inclusions. There is no sparkle effect and perforation holes are hary. This paper has only been observed on the 1/2¢ "Small" Queen (0.00360" - 0.00380").

Paper 9b - AP/1869 - A thinnish, soft paper, slightly off white, with a vague horizontal structure, but without the fragile appearance of paper 9a. The design can be seen from the back with reasonable clarity and most copies exhibit an embossed effect particularly at the top and bottom of the oval. Found on 1/2c 1c both orange-yellow and yellow 2c, 3c and 6c large Queens (0.00260" - 0.00285")

Papers 12, 13 and 19 have not been reported on any of the large Queens.

Paper 10a - AU/1868 - A medium thickness, cream coloured paper, so smooth that the grain is almost invisible. Copies have been mistaken for paper 8a. This paper is not as white as paper 8a, does not take as sharp an impression, nor exhibit the sparkle effect and is a fairly stiff paper easily distinguished from paper 8a by the bending moment test. (0.00290" – 0.00345").

Paper 11 - DE/1870 - A medium to stout, smooth surfaced, greyish toned paper with the design visible from the back and a delicate vertical grain consisting of longer thinner parallel lines rather than the shorter thicker dashes seen in paper 10b. Found in two periods; DE/70 - OC/71 and JA/74 - DE/75 The ½¢, 5¢ and 15¢ large Queens have been found on it.

Shoemaker's & Mitreit's Paper B (0.00285" - 0.00420").



Paper 10b - MR/1869 - This thinnish to stout paper shows a pronounced horizontal grain and frequently diagonal ribbing. It has been observed to vary in thickness from 0.00260" to 0.00385" with observations every 0.00005" in between. Thin examples have been confused with papers 9a and 9b. Shoemaker's, Mitreit's and Hillson's paper A.



Paper 14 - MR/1872 - A smooth, medium to stout greyish toned paper with horizontal grain. It resembles paper 10b, but is of poorer quality. It sometimes shows diagonal ribbing. The ½¢ and 5¢ large Queens have been found on it. Shoemaker's, Mitreit's and Hillson's Paper D (0.00290" - 0.00395").



Paper 15 - DE/1874 - A medium to thick, smooth surfaced, ivory toned paper with a horizontal grain, and after SP/1877 a horizontal or vertical grain and sometimes diagonal ribbing. It is of poorer quality than paper 14. Thick copies have been mistaken for paper 12. The ½¢ and 15¢ large Queen have been found on it. Shoemaker's and Mitreit's Paper F when the grain is horizontal and Paper G when the grain is vertical. Hillson's Paper E (0.00280" - 0.00440").



Paper 16 - FE/1877 - A stout to thick, toned yellowish paper with a horizontal grain and diagonal ribbing. It has the script watermark "Herr Peric & Soure". It is known only on the 15¢ greenish grey large Queen of 1877 (0.00365" - 0.00440").



Paper 17 - JY/1880 - A very thick, white, paper with a faint vertical grain which takes a sharp impression. This paper is known only on the deep dark violet printings of the 15¢ Large Queen (1880). (0.00420" - 0.00510").




Paper 18 – JU/1888 - A thinnish to stout, poor quality, vertical grained, toned yellowish paper which gives a blurry impression. Many copies show embossing of the oval, especially at the top and bottom. Where embossing occurs the image of the stamp can be plainly seen from the back. The 15¢ large Queen has been found on it. Shoemaker's Paper H and Mitreit's Paper I, (0.00270" - 0.00410").



PERFORATIONS

Geoffrey Whitworth's machine identification letter system has been used and extended. Machines 'A' (average gauge 11.7) and 'B' (average gauge 11.8) had been taken out of service before April 1, 1868. Machine 'E' (average gauge 12.5)has only been observed used on the first printing of the 3 cents small Queen and Machine 'H' (average gauge 12.3) has only been observed used on the 1 cent, 2 cents, 3 cents and 6 cents small Queens.



HALF CENT LARGE QUEEN

Issued on April 1, 1868 to pay the rate for:

- Periodicals; within Canada, to PEI, NF and USA under 1 ounce 1868/AP/01 -1897/JU/18;
- Transient newspapers less than 1 ounce anywhere in Canada 1870/JA/01 1897/JU/18;
- Unaddressed circulars and handbills could be distributed to "Every Box Holder" and "Every Householder" at the rate of ½¢ each 1872/MY/01 1897/JU/18;
- In the Maritimes, addressed but unsealed envelopes containing printed matter were allowed to pass for the ½¢ rate for local delivery even though this rate was not authorized in the postal regulations.
