ship in 1953.

During his Presidential Year of Office in 1961 he was involved in a tragic car accident and during the pursuing months he faced his treatment in hospital with a courage and fortitude which one had to admire.

An eminent Philatelist has gone but he will long be remembered by his many friends for his human understanding and kindliness.

The funeral took place privately on Friday, 4th May at the Downs Crematorium, Brighton.

DUPLEX CORNER

New discoveries in duplex cancellations are becoming very few and far between. Does this possibly signify that we are coming to an end of duplex?

However Dr. K. M. Day has recently unearthed two new and interest-

ing duplex from Montreal, which are described below:

(i) A screwed type duplex, the killer being two concentric circles. The



2-ring target type, used in Toronto, Winnipeg, and half a dozen other P.O.s is now well known, but this is the first example of the two concentric circles (i.e. without central bullseye) being so used. On cover dated 11 Oct. 1880, the dater

showing indicia 5 P.M.

(ii) The second duplex cancellation is of the standard type with dater showing QUE at base, indicia 7, dated May 1877. The killer is of the



usual circular pattern, but has 16 thin horizontal bars! This is only the third duplex on record without a numeral to show more than 15 horizontal bars (the other two being the weird Railway cancel—see Handbook plate VI No. 11, and a Jarvis duplex

with 21 bars).

This is the last instalment of DUPLEX CORNER that will appear in MAPLE LEAVES, as it has been decided to publish a 2nd edition of the Duplex Handbook, in which any further new discoveries will be recorded. Since the 1st edition was published three years ago, approximately 60 new duplex have been discovered, many of which have been recorded in DUPLEX CORNER, and these will now be added to those recorded in the Handbook, bringing the total of all known duplex to around 470. Three new plates will be required to illustrate the more interesting of these new discoveries.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Mr. Editor,

In the October, 1961, issue of "Maple Leaves" I read of the enquiry of J. Anderson with regard to the meaning of the letters "S.O.S." on Soldiers' mail. For a good many years I have collected Armed Services mail, Prisoner of War mail and Wartime mail. The marking that Mr. Anderson speaks of is a reasonably common one, in various forms, on Canadian Soldiers' mail. It means "Struck Off Strength."

I enclose to you a glossy print which if you wish to use you may as an illustration to this letter if you wish. You will see that the same thing occurs on the rubber stamp on the fifth line

down from top.

This marking was, I am told, used on mail address to Canadian Soldiers who had been returned to Canada to be discharged. This marking was not used if a soldier was returned to Canada on duty or not to be discharged from the service.

The reason for the use of this marking I am led to believe is that the postal authorities thought it was better to return the mail direct to the sender than try to follow the man to be dis-

charged.

Has any member a strike of this smaller hammer on cover or piece?



Special Cancellations were used from Milton West, Fort Erie, Oakville, Port Arthur, Waterloo and Bowmanville, advertising their Centennial Celebrations. Bypex Philatelic Exhibition at Ottawa, the 4th International Congress Symposia of Crystalography at Montreal, are among the other Special Cancels used.

LOCAL GROUPS

The 'Year Book Section' of "Maple Leaves" contains an imposing list of Local Groups, but from the amount of publicity appearing in the

magazine one could well imagine that they were quite moribund.

It so happens that the London Section, which is really very active, wants to increase its membership. On putting various suggestions to the Publicity Manager they were told to go ahead and blow their own trumpets, encourage other Sections to blow theirs and for all of us to keep on blowing the results into every issue of "Maple Leaves".

So, as London is undoubtedly the largest and most active of the Sections we will fill the next few paragraphs with our life story. (If the foregoing expression of opinion does not stir other Sections into print then

our Publicity Manager might as well give up!).

The London Section

Through the energies of Mr. Nugent Clougher this Section was founded in 1948 and settled down the following year to meetings at the Office of the Commercial Counsellor for Canada where it remained until rebuilding necessitated a move in 1960. Most people will appreciate the difficulty of trying to find suitable accommodation in London, or any City, and we were therefore immensely grateful when our troubles were put before Mr. Robson Lowe and he immediately offered us th use of his Offices. Such eminently philatelic surroundings, good light and warmth had an almost immediate effect in that attendances improved considerably.

The aim of the London Section is to attract members of the C.P.S. who are resident in the London area to meet together monthly during the winter season. Members are obtained in various ways—by following up new C.P.S. members whose names are published in "Maples Leaves" or those moving into the area. We also get recruits to both C.P.S. and London from our local Societies. Then periodically we write to all those in the Year

Book who could possibly join us.

We also are grateful for the help given by "Stamp Collecting" and "Philatelic Magazine" whose Editors include us in their "Forthcoming

meetings" and subsequent reports.

As a result of all these efforts our members soared in 1960 to 52 paid members (the annual subscription is 10/–), but deaths, retirements and "lost interest" has reduced us to a net figure now of 41, and an average attendance of 18.

On the administrative side we change our Chairman every two years and the Rules provide for regular retirements from the Council so that

fresh blood may keep the interest going.

Our programmes have, over the years covered the whole field of Canadian philately. Full evening talks by acknowledged authorities are mixed with a number of Members' displays, both general and invited. An experiment has recently been tried by having one evening a season devoted to non-Canadian affairs. On two occasions Directors of Stanley Gibbons Limited have spoken on other aspects of philately; this year our own members gave short talks on their other philatelic interests.

Three years ago we decided that a Challenge Cup should be obtained for annual competition and thus the "Beaver Cup" came into being and with eminent judges in Messrs. Ewart Gerrish, Robson Lowe and A. L. Michael the standard is high, although not beyond the reach of any member who gives time, thought and interest to his collection.

That then, is the London story so far, but what of the future?

We have asked if the Editor will devote space in "Maple Leaves" to Sectional News so that continual references may encourage others to participate in our activities. This he has promised to do IF, and only IF, support from the Sections is forthcoming.

May I therefore make this plea to fellow Secretaries to help to make

this a success. I know it is just one more job but, after all—

RED RIVER SETTLEMENT STAMP

Details of a new commemorative five cent. postage stamp honouring the 150th anniversary of the Red River Settlement were revealed by the Hon. William Hamilton, Postmaster General. The new stamp was released on May 3rd.

In making the announcement, Mr. Hamilton pointed out the importance of the founding of the Red River Settlement in bringing about the development of the area which now comprises the Prairie Provinces. From the 116,000 square miles which were granted to Lord Selkirk, and the small plot

of cultivated land outside Fort Douglas, grew an area which became known as the Granary of the World. From the first "bumper crop" of 1,500 bushels of wheat, production has risen to an average of some 350 million bushels per year.


Mr. Hamilton said the new stamp was designed to draw attention to the tremendous changes and advances in Canada's Prairie Region. He said the stamp both recognises the tremendous task accomplished by Canada's western pioneers, and honours the desecendants of these pioneers who have made the Canadian West a modern productive segment of Canada's burgeoning economy.

The new stamp is a large-size horizontal. It is printed in two colours, green and brown. A portrait of Thomas George, Fifth Earl of Selkirk and founder of the settlement, is shown on the right side in dark brown. A kilted farmer sowing grain outside Fort Douglas, printed in green, completes the background. The denomination is shown at the top left corner. Along the top of the stamp appear the words "The River Settlement—1812" and along the bottom, "La colonie de la Rivière Rouge—1812". The words "Postes—Postage" are printed vertically under the denomination. Some 30,000,000 stamps were printed and the usual first day cover service was provided by the Postmaster at Ottawa.

EARLY CANADIAN RAILWAY POST OFFICES

Part XXIII. The London & Port Stanley Railway





This railway was incorporated in 1853 to build from London on the Great Western Railway (which at that time was being built) and Port Stanley on Lake Erie. The line, which was only $24\frac{1}{2}$ miles long proved an expensive one to build, but it had the advantage of running through picturesque country and it was probably the first Canadian railway which sought to derive profit from excursionists and holiday–makers rather than

from the carriage of freight and business passengers.

It was opened for traffic in 1856 and for the next 25 years that it was in operation, before being leased to the Great Western Railway, it operated at a loss which in 1871 amounted to more than a million and a quarter dollars in principal and unpaid interest. Under the terms of the lease the Great Western agreed to pay a rental of 20,000 dollars a year, to lay a third rail in order that the tracks might be used by the London, Huron & Bruce Railway and to maintain the line in good working condition. One of the first actions of the lessees was to increase the return passenger (excursion) fare from 25 to 30 cents. When in 1882 the Grand Trunk Railway took over the Great Western and its subsidiaries the fare was further increased with the result that a lot of the lake traffic was diverted from Port Stanley to other lake—side ports. As a consequence of the lack of traffic the Grand Trunk withdrew its rolling stock from the line and services were suspended in 1892.

In the following year the Cleveland, Port Stanley & London Transportation & Railway Co. was formed by American interests and succeeded in obtaining the lease of the line from the original lessors, the London City Council. At the end of 1893 the lease was again transferred to the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway, and this lease was subsequently transferred to the Pere Marquette Railway (U.S.A.) when the latter purchased the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway in 1903. This lease expired on 1st July 1915, whereupon the City of London Commission was formed to electrify and operate the railway on behalf ofthe London City Council. The railway has continued to operate under this arrangement until the present time.

In the early days of this railway a railway post office was established by the postal authorities, but the indications are that it was very short lived. As a consequence the postmark used is extremely rare and the only known type is illustrated here, based on information contained in Shaw's

catalogue.

N.B. The London & Port Stanley Railway connected with the Grand Trunk Railway and the Great Western Railway at London, and with the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway at St. Thomas.

The lavishly illustrated 72 page art catalogue did full justice to this auction on April 9, 10, the 587 lots bringing £24,091. The collection, the most important in its class to be sold in London for many years, proved that the international demand for rare British North America continues at strength. Awarded a Gold Medal at "Unipex" in 1960, there were strong sections of covers in each of the five groups, several dozen "splits" and rare Newfoundland airmails which attracted keen specialist attention. The top figures were Vancouver Island 1865 imperf. 5c. used on envelope £525; New Brunswick 1851 6d. yellow and bisected 3d. bright red on letter sheet to Liverpool, £420; New Brunswick 1851 1/reddish mauve on letter sheet inscribed "Money Letter" £400. In Newfoundland a bisected 1/- scarlet-vermilion on cover sold for £360, one and a half 1866 2c on cover made £420; a "Hawker" cover £525 and the companion MS "Martinsyde", a choice cover went to America at £1,200 with other "airs" also fetching good prices. Top figure in Nova Scotia was £400 for a lovely 1/cold violet.

The respective Provinces made: British Columbia and Vancouver Island £2,568; New Brunswick £5.657; Prince Edward Island £1.871; Newfoundland £8.072; Nova Scotia £5.923.

The Canadian Post Office announced last year that they were, in 1962, discontinuing the practice of servicing covers forwarded by collectors from all over the world desiring the cachet of the Calgary Exhibition and Calgary Exhibition Post Office postmark.

To enable collectors to secure this popular cachet, the Calgary Philatelic Society is undertaking the task of servicing these covers during the 1962 Calgary Exhibition and Stampede which is to be held July 9th —14th.

To secure covers, each of which will receive the cachet and Exhibition postmark, collectors should adhere to these instructions:

- Any number of addressed envelopes may be sent not later than 30th June 1962, for servicing to: The Calgary Philatelic Society, P.O. Box 1055, Calgary, Alberta, Canada.
 - Envelopes should contain a "filler."
- Requests for servicing should include servicing charges of 10c, per cover.
 N.B. Stamps not acceptable.
- 4. Requests for servicing should be accompanied by either:
 - 1. Sufficient Canadian Postage and remittance of service charge or
 - Postal Note, Money Order or certified cheque in Canadian funds, payable to The Calgary Philatelic Society for the required postage and service charges.


